ACT News

Residential and Subdivision Policy review - Draft Variation 306

Draft variation 306 has recently been released for comment. The draft variation was prepared to implement a review of the ACT residential and subdivision policies.

The draft variation proposes:

- changes to residential development, estate development and leasing codes
- replacement of residential zones objectives development tables, and housing development codes
- introduction of Residential Zones Development Code and Lease Variation General Code
- replacement of existing Residential Subdivision Development Code with an Estate Development Code

Some of the changes include:

- changes to solar access provisions
- boundary setback changes
- reduces the minimum block size for dual occupancy in RZ2 (suburban core zone) from 800 sqm to 700 sqm
- allows 3 dwellings on blocks above 1050 (currently above 1400) but limits the number of dwelling thereafter based on block size
- changes to subdivision provisions for new estates

Some of the changes commence immediately.

Draft variation 306 supersedes draft variations 301 and 303 following a review of policies proposed in draft variations 301 and 303 which were put out for public comment last year. Draft variations 301 and 303 have now been withdrawn.

Residential feed-in Tariff finished

The ACT Government has recently announced that the legislated cap of 15 megawatts on small scale electricity generators (essentially household solar panels), which it introduced in February this year, has been reached (see previous EDO newsletter). Consequently the feed in tariff scheme will no longer be available for small scale generators.

The feed in tariff still is available for medium scale renewable energy generators, that is systems between 30kW and 200kW. There is a cap of 15MW for medium scale generation, however the Government has said that this is currently largely unallocated.

The Government has also indicated that it intends to introduce legislation later this year to apply to large scale generators, to encourage the establishment solar farms across the Territory.

ACT sets 15% renewables by 2012 target

As required under the Climate Change and Greenhouse Gas Reduction Act the ACT Government has set renewable energy targets. The Government has set a target to source 15% of all energy from renewable sources by 2012, and 25% by 2020. This target is aimed at assisting in reaching the Government's target of cutting greenhouse gas emissions by 40% by 2020, and for ACT to carbon neutral by 2060.

Under the Climate Change legislation the Government is still required to set energy efficient targets for the per person use of electricity on the ACT and must determine a method for measuring greenhouse gas emissions.

A climate change council is also to be established.

Gang Gang Logo retained

The ACT Government has announced that it intends to retain the Gang-Gang logo for the ACT Parks and Conservation Service. The Gang-Gang is the faunal emblem of the ACT and has been used to represent parks and conservation in the ACT since the 1970s.

Following the Hawke review recommendation that a single ACT Government logo be designed to represent all Government, concern was raised that the gang-gang logo would be lost.

However the long standing tradition and association of the Gang-Gang logo was considered a special case and the Gang-Gang logo will be retained and will be cobranded alongside the new Government logo.

New Ministerial and Departmental Responsibilities relating to the environment

Following the retirement of the former Chief Minister, Jon Stanhope, and the restructuring of the ACT public service following the Hawke review (see previous EDO newsletter) there have been a number of changes to Ministerial and Departmental responsibilities relating to environment and planning.

Following the Hawke Review the ACT Government has set up a single ACT government Department with different directorates. The former Department of Environment, Climate Change, Energy and Water is now part of the Environment and Sustainable Development Directorate. The new Directorate unites DECCEW with planning (including development assessment, leasing, construction, land use and utilities regulation, surveying and land information), the Government architect, heritage, transport planning and nature conservation.

Simon Corbell, MLA, is the new Minister for the Environment and Sustainable Development and the Minister for Territory and Municipal Services.

Productivity report on Australia's Urban Water Sector

The Productivity Commission has released a draft report on Australia's Urban Water Sector. In this draft report it has canvassed a scheme of scarcity pricing, that is a scheme that would make water cheaper when dam storage levels are high. This could mean that the price of water in ACT will change depending upon dam storage levels.

Lake Burley-Griffin Investigation

A motion by the ACT Greens calling on the Minister to direct the Commissioner for Sustainability and the Environment to investigate the state of the watercourses and catchment for Lake Burley Griffin, including possible improvements for managing water quality, has been passed by the Legislative Assembly.

Lake Burley-Griffin has been frequently affected by spills from the Queanbeyan Sewerage Plant, which discharges into the Molonglo River, and blue-green algae blooms which has resulted in the lake being closed to water users.

Under the motion the Commissioner is due to report by 30 September 2011.

Residential Tenancies Act (Minimum Standards) Amendment Bill 2011

The ACT Greens have prepared an exposure draft Bill which sets specific minimum standards for energy and water efficiency in residential rental properties amongst other matters.

The Residential Tenancies Act (Minimum Standards) Amendment Bill 2011 would require rental properties to have an energy efficiency rating (EER) of at least 2 by 2013 and an EER of 3 by 2015 with power for the Minister to set a higher energy efficiency standard. Water efficiency is also addressed. The Residential Tenancies Act does not currently address issues of energy efficiency and water efficiency.

Review of National Capital Authority

Dr Allan Hawke AC is currently conducting a review of the role and responsibilities of the National Capital Authority with a particular focus on its planning regime, including the appropriate balance of planning responsibilities between the Commonwealth and ACT governments in Canberra.

It will consider the work of previous taskforces and committees and make recommendations by June 2011 on the future of the Authority for consideration by the Federal Government.

Legislative Assembly Committee Recommendations on FOI

The Legislative Assembly's Standing Committee on Justice and Community Safety has released a report into the *Freedom of Information Act 1989*. The Committee has recommended that the current act be repealed and a new revised act enacted that is consistent with the Commonwealth's FOI Act. The Committee has further recommended that information should be published online routinely and at no cost and that the ACT should enact its own Privacy legislation, to replace the Commonwealth legislation currently in force.

News From Around Australia

Garnaut Report released

Professor Garnaut recently released his final report in the update of the Climate Change Review reports. The final report recommends that Australia's initial carbon price be in the range of \$20 to \$30, with \$25 being the most appropriate price.

Professor Garnaut released two supplementary notes together with the final report. The first note, 'A 10-year plan for carbon pricing revenue', outlines the recommended allocation of funds generated by the carbon pricing scheme. The note recommends that upon the

commencement of the scheme:

- 55 per cent of revenue raised from the scheme is allocated to household assistance (increasing to 60-65 per cent by 2021-22), with the majority being channelled towards reducing personal income tax rates at the lower end of the income scale.
- 30 per cent of revenue is allocated to trade-exposed emissions-intensive industries, falling to 20 per cent by 2021-22, depending on assessment by an independent agency.
- Substantial funds, rising over time, are directed towards innovation and the purchase of offset credits from rural Australia.

The second note, 'Governance arrangements for Australia's carbon pricing scheme', outlines institutional and administrative arrangements to support the carbon pricing scheme. It recommends the establishment of three bodies:

- An independent committee to advise on targets, coverage, scheme reviews, the switch to a floating price and progress on international action.
- An independent carbon bank to regulate the carbon pricing scheme. It would apply
 the legislated scheme rules and administer assistance to emissions-intensive, tradeexposed industries.
- An independent agency to develop recommendations for a new assistance regime for emissions intensive, trade exposed industries to operate after the initial 3 year interim period.

Climate Commission first report released

The first major report from the independent Climate Commission, The Critical Decade: an update on climate science, risks and responses, has been released.

The key messages set out in the report are:

- There is no doubt that the climate is changing. The evidence is overwhelming and clear.
- We are already seeing the social, economic and environmental impacts of a changing climate. In the last 50 years the number of record hot days in Australia has more than doubled, sea level has risen by 20 cm globally since the late 1800s, and the Great Barrier Reef has suffered from nine bleaching events in the past 31 years.
- It is beyond reasonable doubt that human activities the burning of fossil fuels and deforestation are triggering the changes we are witnessing in the global climate.
- This is the critical decade. Decisions we make from now to 2020 will determine the severity of climate change our children and grandchildren experience we must decarbonise our economy and move to clean energy sources by 2050. That means carbon emissions must peak within the next few years and then strongly decline.

Environment laws on hold

The federal government will wait until at least 2 years before it responds to the Hawke Review of the EPBC Act. The Review has recommended that environmental laws be strengthened to provide greater environmental protection and to make them easier for businesses to navigate. The Review was originally delivered to the government in October 2009, while Peter Garrett was Minister for the Environment, but current Minister Tony Bourke does not expect any legislative changes to the Act to occur until 2012.

Tarkine Heritage Listing

Federal Environment Minister Tony Burke has announced he will not renew an emergency heritage listing, which expired in December, for Tasmania's Tarkine wilderness. The Tarkine wilderness is the largest cool temperate rainforest in Australia, and one of the last remaining areas for Tasmanina Devils not infected with facial tumours.

Mr Burke has said the expired emergency listing related to plans to put a road through the wilderness and now has to lapse, as he has been advised by his department that the current mining proposals for the area do not give rise to the conditions for an emergency listing.

The Australian Heritage Council has recommended that the Tarkine be placed on the National Heritage List.

More recently it has been revealed that despite the Senate passing a motion in 2007 supporting a request to the Australian Heritage Council to review the Tarkine's world heritage values and report back to then Environment Minister Malcolm Turnbull, the Council has never received such a request from the federal government.

Pulp Mill gets final Federal government approval

The Federal Government has approved the final three modules of Gunns proposal to build its controversial pulp mill in Tasmania's Tamar Valley. This is the final environmental approval required under federal environmental law.

Former Environment Minister Malcolm Turnbull approved the Gunns Pulp Mill in October 2007. Mr Turnbull's approval included a requirement that Gunns develop an environmental impact management plan. A decision on approving three modules of the plan was deferred in January 2009 by the then Environment Minister Peter Garrett, until March 2011 until studies on potential marine impacts had been completed.

The Environment Minister, Tony Burke, has now approved these three modules of the environmental management plan.

Product Stewardship Bill introduced

The Federal Government has introduced legislation establishing national standards for the manufacture and disposal of common household electronic products. The *Product Stewardship Bill* mandates recycling and reuse practices and will include standards for reducing hazardous waste in production. The Bill would provide the necessary legislation to establish the national TV and computer recycling scheme in 2012, as these items will be initially affected. It also aims to increase the IT recycling rate to 80% by 2020-21. Importers and manufacturers of TVs, computers and computer peripherals would be required to pay for their collection and recycling. Litigation News

Xstrata Ulan mine approval challenged

The NSW EDO, on behalf of the Hunter Environmental Lobby, is challenging approval for Xstrata to extend its Ulan open-cut coal mine in the Hunter Valley. The first hearing of this case has recently been held in the NSW Land and Environment Court.

The approvals being challenged allow for the consolidation of Ulan's 24 existing development consents into a single planning approval, expansion of its existing underground "longwall" mining operations and new open cut mining operation. These approvals will see a doubling of Ulan's existing approved production rate to up to 20 million tonnes of coal per year.

The mine expansion is predicted to have a significant impact on groundwater, which is expected to take 200 years to recover. It will also result in the clearing of 409 hectares of vegetation, including 69 hectares of endangered ecological communities and habitat for several fauna species. The greenhouse gas emissions from the mine will add approximately 12.7 million tonnes of carbon dioxide per year to the atmosphere, exacerbating global anthropogenic climate change.

The grounds of appeal are in relation to groundwater, biodiversity offsets and greenhouse gas emissions.

NSW's Coal-Seam Gas Project challenged

The NSW EDO, on behalf of Barrington-Gloucester-Stroud Preservation Alliance Inc, has lodged an appeal against two decisions of the Planning Assessment Commission (PAC) to approve a concept plan and stage one of the Gloucester Gas Project at Barrington tops north of Newcastle, NSW's first large scale coal seam gas project.

The concept plan involves extraction of coal seam gas within a 210km area between Barrington and Great Lakes, transporting the gas from the processing facility to the existing gas supply network via a 95-100 km pipeline traversing several LG areas, a gas delivery station at Hexham. The stage one project approval is for 110 gas wells and gas and water pipelines between Gloucester and Stratford, a central processing facility, gas transmission pipeline 95-100 km in length and the Hexham gas delivery station.

Key issues are:

- Risks to surface and groundwater quality and quantity when the gas wells are drilled;
- Lack of data about groundwater impacts in the context of the geological receiving environment, which contains numerous cracks and fissures in the coals seams;
- What to do with the polluted waste water, which is proposed to be re-used or disposed of; and
- Uncertainty about the impacts of the chemicals used in the fracking process.

The case will focus on the PAC's consideration of the environmental impacts resulting from the Gloucester Gas Project. The first court date is June 14.

Case filed against Queensland Xstrata mine

The Queensland EDO, on behalf of Friends of the Earth, is challenging the Queensland Government's approval for Xstrata Coal's mine in QLD's south-west. The QLD EDO has lodged "a climate change and ocean acidification objection" with the Queensland mining registrar. Xstrata's Wandoan EIS estimated that over its 30-year life the mine would increase Queensland's human-induced greenhouse gas by about 0.38% emissions and Australia's by about 0.11%.

FOE wants the government to refuse Xstrata Coal a mining lease and environmental authority, due to concerns over damage to Queensland's natural heritage.

A Land Court judge will hear the objection and then make a recommendation to the Queensland mines and environment ministers for a final decision.

Court clears Paradise Dam

The Federal Court has dismissed the Wide Bay Conservation Council Inc (WBCC) case, for an injunction to overturn the Federal Government's environmental approval for the Paradise Dam on Queensland's Burnett River. The case challenged whether the defendant had adequately fulfilled the requirement attached to an approval under the EPBC Act for state-owned Burnett Water Pty Ltd to install a fish transfer device, or fishway, to allow rare lungfish to move over the dam's 36m spillway. Justice Logan agreed the lungfish was a "living fossil" that needed protection but also found the fishway installed was "suitable for the lungfish" and was operating in the way it was intended. Burnett Water were found not to have contravened the condition, and the injunction was not granted accordingly.

Snowy River Flow case

The EDO NSW, acting on behalf of the Snowy River Alliance, has challenged the validity of the Water Administration Ministerial Corporation's review of the Snowy Hydro water licence and a subsequent variation to the licence. SRA is arguing that the WAMC's review failed to meet the description of "review" as required by the Act and failed to exhibit any SSC reports prior to the review. If the review is found to be invalid, the variation to the licence may also be invalid.

The matter was heard before the Supreme Court on the 14 March 2011 with judgment reserved.
