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ACT News

Latham Group Centre proposed redevelopment

A proposed redevelopment at the former Latham shopping centre block highlights changes to the planning laws which came into effect last year. The new laws mean that even if a proposed development is not notified as required by the legislation, any subsequent development approval is not invalidated by the inadequate notification.

In Latham a proposal to vary the current lease for a block of land in the Latham group centre to allow the land to be used for residential use was advertised. However the notification of the proposal failed to notify that in addition to a lease variation the development proposed to demolish all buildings on the site and to construct 13 multi storey apartments.

If the notification of a proposal does not fully describe a proposal this can significantly affect a person's decision whether to put in a submission or not. This in turn can affect a person's right to seek review of any decision to approve a development, which relies on a person having made a submission.

The former Land Act provided a much more limited invalidation provision. Only if the sign on the land notifying of the proposal was not properly erected did the Act provide that this would not invalidate any subsequent approval.

EDO has been providing advice to residents in relation to this matter.

Changes to Planning Regulations allow single dwellings and school related structures to be built without development approval

Changes to planning regulations mean that single dwellings that are to be demolished, rebuilt or extended no longer need development approval, as long as the development meets the requirements under the Single Housing Development Code. Prior to these amendments single dwellings in new estates were exempt from development approval requirements. This has now been extended to exempt single dwelling developments in all residential zones.

Certain school related developments can also be built without development approval as a result of amendments to the planning regulations. These amendments were made in response to the Federal Government's stimulus package to facilitate building activities at schools.

These amendments do not affect any requirements to get building approvals.

EDO has provided advice to members of the community in relation to the application of

these exemptions to proposed school developments.

Canberra Airport Expansion

The Federal Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, the Hon. Anthony Albanese MP, must soon make a decision on Canberra Airport's 2009 preliminary Draft Master Plan, which includes plans for a 24-hour freight and passenger hub.

Airservices Australia has released its Canberra Quarterly Report (January to March 2009) for the Noise and Flight Path Monitoring System. This includes the first reports from the Hackett Noise monitor established in response to community concerns about noise associated with the proposed expansion.

Curfew4Canberra has indicated that this report shows that aircraft noise is experienced in north Canberra at levels that will disturb sleep and shows that aircraft noise is not contained in the High Noise Corridor.

Molonglo Valley – exemptions from Environmental Impact statement

The Minister for Planning has exempt some of the initial land release areas in the Molonglo Valley from requiring a full environmental impact statement.

Under planning legislation the Minister can only exempt development from EIS requirements if satisfied that the environmental impacts of the development proposal has already been sufficiently addressed by another study. A report on the EIS exemption is available at ACTPLA's website at:

Federal Renewable Energy Target Legislation passed

Federal Parliament has passed the renewable energy target legislation. The legislation sets a renewable energy target of 20% by 2020. This means that 20% of Australia's electricity will have to be generated from renewable energy sources by 2020.

Final approval for Gorgon Gas Development on Barrow Island

The controversial Gorgon gas development on Barrow Island has been approved by the Federal Environment Minister Peter Garrett subject to a number of conditions. The development had earlier been approved by Western Australian Environment Minister Donna Faragher.

The Minister's approval follows on from a recent agreement between Gorgon's joint venture partners for the sale of \$50 billion of liquefied natural gas from Australia to China.

Barrow Island is home to a number of rare, endangered and endemic species including the threatened flatback turtle. The island is also surrounded by significant coral reefs.

The Gorgon partners are expected to make a final investment decision by the end of September.

New web portal on energy efficiency

The Federal Government has developed a new web portal LivingGreener.gov.au which is designed to boost householder efforts to save energy, water and reduce waste.

LivingGreener.gov.au includes practical information and tools on how householders can live more sustainably, save money and help the environment.

Climate Change Risks for World Heritage Properties

The Commonwealth Department of Environment has recently released a report on the implications of climate change for Australian world heritage properties. The report has found that seventeen of Australia's iconic World Heritage properties will experience increased risks from climate change.

Natural sites including the Great Barrier Reef, Kakadu National Park, Lord Howe Island Group, the Tasmanian Wilderness and the Greater Blue Mountains Area are identified as particularly vulnerable to the effects of climate change, as is the Sydney Opera House.

These effects include reduced rainfall, higher sea and land surface temperatures, more severe storm events, ocean acidification and rising sea levels.

Federal Court access to justice reforms

The Federal Government has recently introduced legislation into Parliament that aims to reduce the cost of litigation and minimise unnecessary court delays in the Federal Court. The Access to Justice (Civil Litigation Reforms) Amendment Bill 2009 introduces targeted reforms to ensure people are able to resolve their disputes quickly, effectively and fairly. The Bill's key reforms include:

- introducing an overarching obligation to facilitate the just resolution of disputes as quickly, inexpensively and efficiently as possible;
- providing powers to impose cost penalties on parties and their lawyers who fail to comply with this duty;
- clarifying directions the Court can make to control the progress and conduct of legal proceedings; and
- streamlining appeal pathways to reduce confusion for litigants and ensure the best management of Court resources.

Fraser Island receives UN biosphere protection

The Great Sandy region, which includes Fraser Island, has been declared a biosphere reserve at a UNESCO meeting in South Korea.

Biospheres are sites of significant biodiversity that are managed under strict conservation and sustainable development principles.

The Great Sandy Region is the 15th biosphere to be declared in Australia.

Federal Government introduces Green loans

The Federal Environment Minister, Peter Garrett, has announced a green loans scheme with the introduction of low-interest \$10,000 loans available to make homes more energy and

water efficient.

The Green loans are aimed at enabling households to invest in energy efficient lighting, appliances, heating, ceiling insulation, and solar heating. The scheme also seeks to encourage simple, low-cost actions like changing light globes, sealing draughts, repairing leaking taps and installing water tanks.

Households will receive the loan from their bank, and then pay it back at a low interest rate, which is to be subsidised by the Government.

The Coral Sea encompasses a diverse range of underwater habitats and is home to a spectacular array of wildlife, being one of the few places in the world where large pelagic fishes such as tuna and sharks have not been severely depleted.

Public Transport Plan released for comment

The ACT Chief Minister and Minister for Transport Jon Stanhope recently released the *Strategic Public Transport Network Plan* which sets the vision for how public transport in Canberra could operate by 2031, and is designed to help the ACT meet its sustainable transport target of 16 percent of work trips on public transport by 2026.

A number of public consultation sessions have been held throughout August. The Government has indicated that amongst other things they are particularly seeking input on what level of public transport services the community expects in the future.

Community feedback on the Plan will form the basis of the ACT Public Transport Strategy which is a key part of the ACT Government's Sustainable Transport Action Plan 2010-2016.

Consultation on plastic bags

The ACT Government has recently announced that it has begun public surveys across the ACT to gather information on how plastic bags are used and to gauge opinions on a possible ban or levy. The consultation process is designed to feed into a future waste strategy for the ACT.

Telephone surveys have already commenced. There will also be the opportunity to have a say through consultation sessions taking place in shopping centres. The dates and times for these will be advertised in the local media.

Indigenous Heritage Law

A discussion paper on Australian laws to protect Indigenous heritage has been released for public comment. This is an opportunity for the public to contribute ideas on making the Commonwealth's *Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Heritage Protection Act 1984* (ATSIHP Act) more effective as a way to protect traditional areas and objects significant to Indigenous Australians. The Australian Government is proposing to reform this Act to improve Indigenous heritage protection laws nationally.

Litigation News

NSW EDO climate case an Australian first

A case bought by NSW EDO before the NSW Land and Environment Court will be the first in Australia to test whether state pollution laws cover the harmful impact of CO₂. EDO NSW on behalf of Peter Gray and Naomi Hodgson has commenced proceedings against Macquarie Generation seeking a declaration that the State-owned company has been negligently disposing of waste at their Bayswater Power Station by emitting carbon dioxide into the atmosphere in a manner that has harmed or is likely to harm the environment in contravention of section 115(1) of the *Protection of the Environment Operations Act 1997 (NSW)*. Mr Gray and Ms Hodgson also seek an injunction requiring Macquarie Generation to immediately cease disposing of waste through the emission of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. In carrying out its electricity generation activities, Macquarie Generation has been issued with an environment protection licence which licences the company to emit certain waste but not carbon dioxide.

Bayswater Power Station, located in the Upper Hunter Valley, has the highest carbon dioxide emissions of all power stations in NSW.

Firm fined under EPBC Act for Tree Clearing

The Federal Court has imposed a \$220,000 fine on the director of a SA horticultural firm for illegally clearing native trees to grow carrots. The deliberate and unlawful clearance was "likely to have a significant impact on" the endangered south-eastern red-tailed black cockatoo, Fed Court Justice John Mansfield said in his July 17 decision. It was the second fine imposed for the offence, this time under the federal *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Act* (EPBC Act).

In Nov 2008, Rocky Lamattina & Sons Pty Ltd (RLS) and its director Rocco Lamattina were convicted and fined \$119,000 in the SA Magistrates' Court for breaching the State's *Native Vegetation Act*. They had pleaded guilty to clearing more than 270 trees, between 50-200 years old, from their freehold Acacia Downs property and leasehold areas on a nearby property in 2005.

As it stands, five individuals and one organisation are being sued for activities relating to their involvement in protests opposing the Gunns pulp mill and advocating protection of Tasmania's forests.
